MEMORY CORNER

After nearly 12 years away from Camp Crestridge, I was given the opportunity to spend two weeks as a "Lodge Lady" in 2010. Having spent summers in the 1980s and 1990s with titles including camper, JET, counselor, village director, and waterfront director, I wasn't sure what I would find waiting for me as a Lodge Lady. This article is not necessarily about being a Lodge Lady, although I can assure you that the title comes with lots of hard work and plenty of laughs. This particular Memory Corner is about something else. It is about what it is like to have all of your old memories of summers at Crestridge mix in with new memories. It is about what it is like to arrive with your honor bands and every pair of shorts you own in a place where everything is different and yet still so much the same. It is about change and constants and singing and that overwhelming sense of a place where God's love is reflected from every surface, in every song, and from every face.

So many things are different about Camp Crestridge from the way I remember them. Some of these are small things and others are huge. There are new buildings: a new crafts lodge, a new Bear Trap, and new cabins. There are more campers – lots more. The old Dining Hall porch has been turned into eating space with a new porch now overlooking the

lake. Central staff no longer fit in the chapel. The numbers on the cabins are different. There are new skills: geocaching, cooking, mountain biking, knitting, photography, and more. Opening day was a complete revelation. Instead of meandering in all day long, parents and campers line up in their cars before daylight to be the first ones through the gate and first to claim the best bunk. If you are ever in the area on an opening day, you should try to make it by to witness the opening of the gate and the arrival of the campers at the top of the hill. The absolute joy of the girls arriving at the Bear Trap to greet friends and unpack their luggage literally made my hair stand on end. I knew right then that I was in for a treat.

One of my most vivid memories from my first year at camp as a Chippewa in 1980 was sitting down to dinner and suddenly everyone around me jumping up to sing and sing and sing. No one had warned me about this - and I loved it. I also loved Singspiration. As a Chippewa and Chickasaw, that was probably my favorite activity at camp. So when I went back last summer, I was looking forward to the singing – in the dining hall, in the chapel, at campfire, everywhere. I wasn't disappointed. The campers of 2010 sang with just as much happiness as we did. And now they dance, too. One of my favorite new memories from this

past summer was a Tuesday night when cookout got rained out and every cabin was gathered in the dining hall waiting for their dinner. Even though it was wet and I'm sure everyone was hungry, no one looked unhappy. Instead, campers and counselors were singing at the top of their lungs and dancing and smiling.

Being back at Crestridge truly was a blessing. In the face of so many changes, I was ecstatic to see that the heart and soul of Crestridge is the same as I remember. It is still a place where everyone feels accepted for who she is. It is still a place where children see daily examples of how wonderful it is to be a child of God. It is still a place where you hear bells telling you to wake up or go to lunch. It is still a place where you can sing in the middle of dinner. It is still a place where you are likely to make lifelong friends. And, most important, it is still a place where God speaks out loud to girls, young women, and not-soyoung women (and maybe a handful of guys, too) about how very much He loves them..

Scholarship Endowment and Annual Scholarship Fund Updates by Susan McFerrin Nielsen

Alumnae and Friends continue to support camp and its campers with \$12,000 in scholar-ship donations each summer. One source of this yearly donation is the interest from the Scholarship Endowment Fund. Our Scholarship Endowment Fund continues to grow, with three fully-funded named scholarships and two more open for donations.

The Scholarship Endowment Fund was established in 2007. Cumulative donations totaling \$10,000 enable the naming of a scholarship for one or two indi-

viduals. If you would like to start a named scholarship or donate to an existing one, just earmark your donation to the Endowment Fund with the individual's name.

Named scholarships have been given in memory of long-time staffer Judye MacMillan, in memory of camper Maggie Lee Henson, and in honor of Sallie Garvin Driggers and Willa Stevenson McGimsey, who became life-long friends at camp. Scholarships have also been started and await donations in memory of Julie Parkerson and in honor of

camp friends Ramey Driggers Schutz and Kara Belcher Coolev.

Imagine... A New Camp Store and Museum by Lisa Rudolph Turner

For years now camp has had to make do with a failing store building that is too small, showing a great deal of wear, and not set up to serve the numbers of campers and family coming through each summer. At the same time, camp's heirlooms, treasures and archives – items that cannot be replaced – have been housed in a cramped, non-air conditioned/heated space in the lodge. And third, there has been a shortage of space to house recreational equipment used on the green.

Several years ago, the CCAF board voted to begin fundraising aimed at building a new space where the current store stands to fit all three of those needs. To date, we have raised about \$90,000 toward this important project. We need at least \$130,000 to break ground and begin laying the foundation for a space that will meet camp's needs for generations to come. We are so close, yet it seems so far from making this dream a reality.

Plans for the site include areas for the store, post office and restrooms on the main level, heated and cooled museum and archive space on the second level, and storage for recreational equipment in the basement. The building will have a similar look to the new Bear Trap.

Some of the funds raised to date have come from donations. Others have been raised through the sale of stepping stones that we are placing outside the chapel in honor or in memory of loved ones or friends.* Either way, you can make a difference in the lives of young girls for decades to come. With God's help we'll stop dreaming and start digging!
